### Executive Director Note



The growth that Bluff Lake Nature Center has seen over the past handful of years is showing no signs of slowing down. Much of 2021 was spent strengthening our organization, ensuring that we will be here long into the future. Our staff and Board of Directors engaged in an analysis of our Mission, Vision, and Core Values, giving them thoughtful updates that better reflect the important work we are doing. We also invested significantly in our staff and volunteers, providing more intentional trainings that included topics such as diversity, equity, and inclusion; child mental health and development; and working with individuals experiencing homelessness.

As our organization has grown, so has the team that supports us. Our current team includes four full-time staff members, three full-time AmeriCorps environmental educators, a 10 person Board of Directors, multiple committees, eight full-time summer camp staff, and a dedicated cadre of both site and education volunteers and interns. Together we are able to manage our site, which had more visitors in 2021 than ever before, engage with thousands of kids and families through programing, and further our mission of making nature accessible in the city. I am so proud of what we have been able to accomplish and excited for what's next!



### Understanding Our Site

We are constantly learning more from our site thanks to the hard work of our staff, volunteers, interns, and other community scientists.

83,187 Research grade observations made through eBird and iNaturalist by the public, volunteers, and staff to date

677 Documented plant and animal species on the site.


BLNC Land Manager Erickson and our Natural Resource and Site Management Committee have been hard at work developing a lake management plan now that we have a year-round lake!

One key component of this research is understanding where the water in our lake comes from. The map to the right shows a portion of the storm drains (red dots) that currently feed directly into the lake. By knowing this information we can work to improve water quality and ensure a healthy habitat

247 Storm drains from Denver and Aurora drain directly to Bluff Lake running through a total of 11.55 miles of storm pipes!

766 Acres is the size of the Bluff Lake watershed

### PROBLEM-BASED LEARNING (PBL)

As a part of our inquiry based educational programming, Bluff Lake has worked with local STEM schools to develop a new field trip model called Problem-Based Learning (PBL). Complex real-world problems are used as the vehicle to promote student learning of concepts and principles, as opposed to direct presentation of facts and concepts.

Bluff Lake is able to provide students with these real-world "problem statements" and we are thrilled to work with students as they help develop exciting and innovative solutions to our questions through visits to our site, experiments, and their own imagination and curiosity.

We completed nine PBL units in 2021, spanning elementary school, middle school, high school, and teacher professional development, reaching 643 students and completing 1,452 total student interactions (two to three visits with each class).

### **PBL Problem Statements**

"Bluff Lake needs a way to honor human interaction while keeping our environment and waterways clean. How can Bluff Lake protect the environment (plants and animals) while allowing people to enjoy the area?"

-Human Environment Interaction PBL with 1st graders

"What are the major cultures and languages in the Denver area that we should be most conscious of, especially within a 15-mile radius of Bluff Lake?"

-Cultural Inclusiveness PBL with 8th-12th grade English Language Learners "Bluff Lake needs a way to reduce nutrient contamination, because actions by people in the neighborhood around Bluff Lake are impacting the water quality of the lake. How can this contamination be reduced?"

-Water Quality PBL with 8th and 9th graders






### **LEARNING TOOLS**






